


Research position statement

Introduction

While the Sunshine Coast Health Network (SCHN) Ltd., trading as Central Queensland, Wide Bay, Sunshine Coast Primary Health Network, is not a research organisation, it is committed to providing an integrated and improved primary health care system to the communities in its region (Figure 1).

Vision:

Mission:

Responsive and effective solutions that optimise population health and wellbeing

Research is one of the key means by which SCHN can pioneer innovation in primary health care, for example, through new models of care to drive change. By establishing a research position statement, SCHN will be better able to facilitate opportunities to collaborate and establish partnerships for grant funding, needs assessments, joint planning and commissioning, and data linkage.

The establishment of a research position statement will also support SCHN to:

- take advantage of opportunities to lead, support and collaborate in quality research as they arise
- provide a systematic approach to how it approves, and determines capacity and suitability, in line with its strategic goals as well as national and local health priorities
- maximize the value of its work by establishing partnerships with university, Hospital and Health Service (HHS) partners and other relevant stakeholders
- apply for relevant grant funding as a collaborative partner and/or lead agency (when applicable), and
- manage the multiple requests it receives for support and participation in research.

Background

Primary Health Networks (PHNs) have been established with the key objective of increasing the efficiency and effectiveness of health services for patients, particularly those at risk of poor health outcomes, and improving coordination of care to ensure patients receive the right care, in the right place, at the right time. Table 1 lists the key national and local PHN priorities and Table 2 shows the key priorities of SCHN and associated research activities. Research enables SCHN to achieve its vision and mission to be recognised as a leader in delivering efficient health care solutions and for its agility in getting services to the community where they are needed most.


